Seeing groups of students create detailed drawings of scary monsters in a haunted mansion—all in the service of better understanding a Gothic short story.

### Advice for Overcoming Roadblocks:

Don't be afraid of change! I needed more class time to implement a lot of my new strategies after ALSI, and ultimately, I had to reduce our reading list. It was hard to let go of some literary works, but the quality of our engagement with the works that remained made it well worth it.

### Words of Wisdom:

Develop a "Why not?" approach when considering new ideas. If there's an assignment you don't like grading, there's a good chance retooling it could improve outcomes for you AND your students. And giving students various options to choose from for papers or final projects almost always results in better work.
